The newly developed lights will highlight and accent features of the home, yard and garden; insure safety illumigarden; insure sately matter and nation for walks, steps and driveways, and, as a bonus, provide protective light to discourage prowlers.

Outdoor lighting has been

considered a luxury. With usual 110-volt current wiring has to be buried, permanent outdoor receptacles are need-ed for each light, and a building permit and an electrical contractor frequently is needed to install a system.

However, the low-voltage lights can be installed by the homeowner himself and moved to another location at will, according to Miss Roden, an advisor to a manufacturer of a new system of outdoor lights.

Called Intermatic Malibu Lights, they use only 12 volts of power and involve no exor power and involve no ex-pensive, permanent installa-tion work. The expense of underground wiring is elim-inated. The low-voltage is supplied by a compact trans-former which converts 110 volt horsepower, and the cur-rent is carried by a cable put along the ground.

Miss Roden explained that

the safety factor of the lights is such that 12-volt power

used for them is the same strength for children's toys. Miss Roden gives these five points for effective lighting of the home exterior:

- Proper planning starts with a rough sketch of your premises: house, garage, paths, driveway, bushes, trees, etc.
- Indicate areas to be lighted and outdoor electrical outlets for locating transformers.
- Don't try for a daylight effect with modern decorative outdoor lighting or you will lose the esthetic effect of subtle accents.
- When you have your lo-cations spotted, house-mount your transformer near an outlet and lay cable on the ground to connect "target"
- Connect your lamps by simply clamping them to the cable. Aim lights to achieve the best effect, and install colored lenses for special effects. Intermatic Malibu Lights are manufactured by the International Register Co., Chicago.
