

'Fire Day' Observance Set Here

The doors of all fire stations in the greater Los Angeles area will be wide open, equipment and apparatus shined and polished, and all members ready and waiting for guests Saturday as Fire Service Day is observed from 10 a.m. until 5 p.m. This event is co-sponsored by the Los Angeles Junior Chamber of Commerce.

Mayor Sam Yorty, who annually proclaims Fire Service Day on the first Saturday in May, has urged everyone to visit the local fire station and see one of the big, central displays given by the Fire Department this year.

"Fire protection is one of the most fascinating, yet little understood, functions of our municipal service," Mayor Yorty says. "The service is run by a semi-military organization of expert fire fighters and has its own set of traditions and codes. These can give an interested visitor an insight into a fascinating field."

Originated in 1957 in Los Angeles, Fire Service Day has grown into a statewide celebration. "It's purpose," City Fire Chief Raymond M. Hill said, "is to acquaint citizens more fully with the fire service and to promote a closer feeling of cooperation between firemen and the people they protect. Such a feeling makes our job easier and more effective."

Although all fire stations will hold open house on Fire Service Day, the major displays will no doubt be of particular interest to many. Major displays will be held at several locations, including Ports of Call in San Pedro and Drill Tower 40 at 406 Tuna St., Terminal Island.
