

Assemblyman Sees 1966 As a 'Year of Decision'

This is a critical year of decision for all of us. How we vote at the Primary Election on Tuesday, June 7, and again at the General Election on Tuesday, Nov. 8, will, to a large extent, determine the amount of taxes we pay, the cost of living, our property rights, and our personal liberties. Also, how we vote will affect our children and our children's children.

Among other things, for

16 years I have voted, in committees and on the floor of the Assembly, against bills to create new taxes or increase existing taxes because the power to tax is also the power to control and destroy.

I have served the people of the 46th Assembly District under three Governors. When I was first elected, at the General Election of November, 1950, Earl Warren was Governor. He was followed by Governor Goodwin J. Knight, who in turn was

followed by our present Governor, Edmund G. Brown.

It is a common expression to refer to the State budget as "the Governor's Budget," but that is a very misleading expression. The California budget is so complicated that it requires the work of several hundred people before it is even sent to the State Printing Plant in Sacramento. When it is printed and bound it is a thick, heavy document. For exam-

ple, the current budget consists of 1,175 printed pages and weighs about 10 pounds.

Every budget when it is first presented to the legislature is not only physically big and heavy but the amount of money for which we are expected to vote is tremendous. This is done by each administration for bargaining purposes. Finally, it is cut down and passed by the legislature.

I voted against swollen budgets consistently for 16

years because a swollen budget is always followed by demands for the enactment of new taxes.

Actually, about 65 per cent of the budget each year is based on provisions in the State Constitution or old statutes, leaving the legislature about 35 per cent to debate. Our State Constitution should have been revised by the people years ago and many of the existing laws giving rise to swollen budgets should have

been repealed, but these are extremely difficult things to do.

There definitely is a tax revolt on the part of the people, not only in California but in each of the 50 states. An easy way to verify this is to go to any grocery store or supermarket and see how far money goes in the purchase of food. The high cost of living is caused in part by hidden taxes. The farmer or rancher who raised wheat is hit by heavy federal, state and local

taxes. The baker who bakes bread is struck by heavy taxes. Finally, when a loaf of bread is purchased the hidden taxes are not listed on the wrapper but they are there.

If every person would write about objections to taxes to his or her city councilman, county supervisor, state senator, assemblyman, U.S. senators, and congressman, the tax revolt would accomplish a financial revolution.

When you write to me, I read your letters and I answer your mail. When the
