Suspect Trio in Custody

Three teenagers accused of taking \$1,000 worth of coins, valuable documents, and stocks from a North Torrance home are being held by the San Bernardino County Sheriff's Department, it was reported yesterday.

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Torrance police said the items were taken from the home of John Mainhood, an airline pilot, at 3634 W. 169th St. Friday morning. The youths apparently entered the home through a "dog door" and took a cash box containing the valuable Date. containing the valuable pa-

Mainhood said stock certifi cates worth several hundred dollars, his automobile ownership papers, and various docu-ments concerning his home were in the cash box. A va-riety of foreign coins, as well as several American coins, also were taken.

SAN BERNARDINO Coun ty sheriff's deputies said the youths had the cash box when they were apprehended.

Murder Charge Studied

Torrance police jailed a 25-year-old cab driver early yesterday on suspicion of mur-der after a teenager was shot to death in downtown Torrance following an apparent street fight.

Jailed was Robert Charles Andrus, 2014 Torrance Blvd. He is being questioned in connection with the murder of James Howard Sonju, 17, of 21013 Donora St.

Sonju was shot just before
1 a.m. yesterday in the parking lot of the Palms Restaurant, 1925 W. Carson St. He
was rushed to Little Company
of Mary Hospital, where doctors pronounced him dead at
1:34 a.m.

POLICE SAID the shooting occurred during a fight involving several teenagers and young adults.

Andrus told police several youths had driven past him and made "rude, vulgar comments, then came back." He told police he fired several warning shots into the air after the youths formed a semi-circle around him.

"They kept coming," Andrus said, "they jumped me, knocked me down, and started kicking me and hitting me, so then I shot one of them."

"He's not hurt bad, I only shot him in the side," Andrus added.

Western Avenue Project --

Improvement of Western Avenue between the San Diego Freeway and 25th Street in San Pedro is ready for scheduling as soon as agreements with the cities involved can be completed, it was reported in Sacramento Friday. State highway engineer J. C. Womack said the project calls for rebuilding the entire roadway to make it all four-lane with left-turn pockets and modern signalization. Cost has been estimated at \$2,620,000 of which the state would pay \$1,310,000. The project probably would take six years to finance and complete, Womack reported.
