Road Work Under Way In Carson

Highway improvement projects on two miles of streets in the Carson area have been authorized to increase safety for motorists and pedestrians, Supervisor Kenneth Hahn said yesterday.

Work will consist of resurfacing the following sections of county roads:

Raymond Avenue, Budlong Avenue, Catalina Street, and Berendo Avenue between 204th Street and Torrance Boulevard;

New Hampshire Avenue from Del Amo Boulevard to 204th Street;

Vermont Avenue west service road from Del Amo Boulevard to Torrance Boulevard; Del Amo Boulevard between Vermont and New Hampshire Avenue;

204th Street from New Hampshire to Kenneth Avenue;

Nicoll Avenue from 214th Street to south of Ritner Avenue;

Desford Street and Ritner Avenue easterly of Nicoll Avenue;

218th Street from Moneta Avenue to Caroldale Avenue;

218th Place westerly of Caroldale Avenue, and Caroldale Avenue and Archibald Avenue southerly of 218th Street.

Hahn said the completed improvements will increase safety, reduce maintenance costs, and extend the service life of the roadways.

He complained of abdominal pains and was taken to a hospital, where he allegedly attacked a police officer.

Andrus is being held at the Torrance City Jail. Police will seek a murder complaint from the district attorney's office.

Council to Get Zoning Case Again

The future of a 100-acre parcel of land south of 235th Street and west of Crenshaw Boulevard will be the subject of further City Council study Tuesday evening.

Action on possible new zoning for the 100 acres was delayed last March 2 when Don Wilson, owner of about half the parcel, asked the council to continue the matter for several weeks. Wilson said he had been approached by representatives of Torrance Memorial Hospital about the possible development of a new hospital complex and wanted time to discuss the hospital proposals.

The land, currently zoned for industrial uses, is owned by Wilson and Dan E. Butcher. Wilson has indicated he wants to develop homes on his section of the land.

Butcher previously sought new zoning to permit a cemetery on his parcel, but was turned down by the council. An earlier attempt to secure residential zoning for the Butcher parcel also was turned down by the council.

The city's Planning Commission has asked that the zoning not be changed at this time. The Planning Department also has asked that the zoning not be changed, but has suggested that a so-called "cluster" plan for residential

uses would be acceptable since it will provide for ample open areas.

The council will convene at 8 p.m.

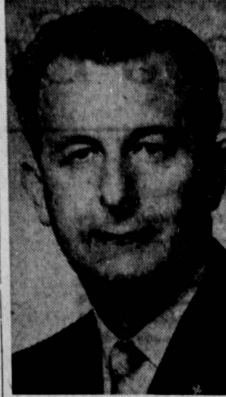
