Irl Davis Has Title Of MVP

'Best' in Athletics

For the first time in eleven years, El Camino College wins the 1965-66 Cari White Trophy, symbolic of best overall Metropolitan Conference athletic supremacy.

El Camino edged Los Angeles Valley College by three and three-fourths points. The Warriors piled up 66% to the Monarchs 63. Long Beach City College is in third with 60% points, with Cerritos College in fourth, scoring 56%.

Bakersfield College, winner of last year's Iron Man award, finished in fifth place tallying 53% points.

Wade Pitches Second Victory

Bruce Wade picked up his second pitching victory of the week Friday as North High defeated Excelsior, 6-3 in the CIF Triple-A baseball playoffs. The victorious Saxons clash with a potent Pacific High of the Citrus Belt League Tuesday afternoon. The site will not be determined until a flip-of-the-coin for home team is completed tomorrow via Commissioner Ken Fagans' honest-proof telephone.

While Wade was giving up three unearned runs to Excelsior at Cerritos College Friday, his teammates pounded out 10 hits for six runs. Ken Stuler, Jeff Osborn, Rich Gonzales and Jerry Ball got two apiece.

The Saxons gave Wade a 3-0 lead going into the bottom of the third, but the Pilots go three back to get even in the game.

North's first run in the second frame came on a double by Gonzales and a subsequent passed ball scored him.

In the third inning Mike Tuffley walked, Osborn singled, Jim Machis was safe on an error, and Gonzales got a sacrifice fly for two runs.

Roger Hansburger and Mike Stoker cleaned the bases with two away in the third to tie the game for Excelsior, but four North singles by Ball, Stuler, Osborn and Wade made it 5-3.

Gonzales' second hit brought in Bachis with the final run in the top of the seventh.

Bishop Montgomery got into the CIF playoffs by beating Crespi twice in league play. Both had 8-2 records.

Large Crowds Expected For Memorial Weekend

Hollywood Park's 1966 thoroughbred meeting reaches a high point of interest this Memorial Day weekend when the colorful Inglewood track welcomes its largest crowds thus far this summer for holiday racing next Saturday and Monday, May 30.

The \$25,000 added Hollywood Express, matching the fastest horses in the West at the abbreviated distance of 5 1/4 furlongs, will highlight Saturday's card at Hollywood Park.

As the feature of a special Memorial Day Monday of racing, the "track of the lakes and flowers" will present the \$50,000 added Will Rogers Stakes at one mile for starters of the three-year-old division.

Post time both Saturday and Monday will be 1:15 p.m., a.m.

Heading a fast field of sprinters in the Hollywood Express will be the defending champion, L. K. Shapiro's Azure Te. The Nashville colt won as a three-year-old in 1965 and will be seeking to repeat his sparkling triumph of a year ago.

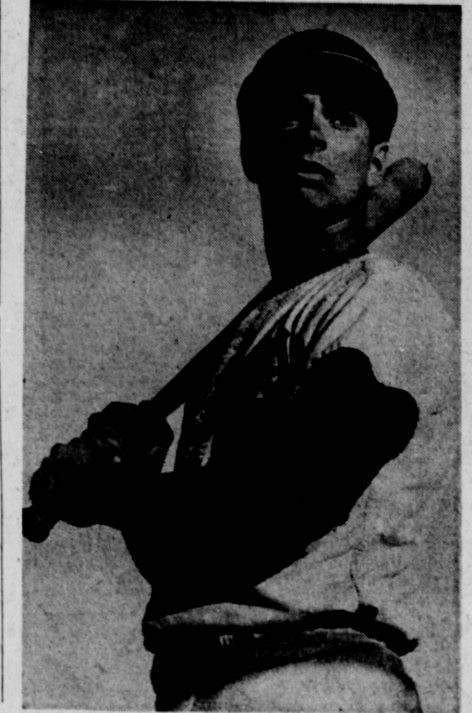
Among his expected rivals are Baron Gruder, Solazo, Emphill's Lodge, Happy Sean and Nasharco.

Sharpe Tosses 1-Hit Shutout

Sky League runner up, Torrance goes into its third CIF-AAA playoff game against Savanna Tuesday with some serious thoughts about winning. The Tartars huddled around Pitcher Bob Sharpe Friday and came up with a 5-0 shutout over Mayfair of the Suburban League at Blair Field to advance to the quarter-finals.

Savanna, a 6-0 winner over Long Beach Poly and 5-4 winner over Covina, came to the playoffs by way of the Crestview League.

Tuesday's game site will not be announced until tomorrow, but the Tartars would just as soon return to the beautiful Long Beach ballpark where Sharpe hurled a splendid one-hitter and the offense came up with some clutch hitting.

The Tartars got off to a 2-0 lead in the first inning against Mayfair. With one away Bart Johnson doubled and Second Baseman Dan Powell took Fred Kendall's grounder and tried to get Johnson at third. He errored on the throw and Kendall wound up on second as the run scored. Kendall came home on John Ziemke's hit.

Kendall doubled with two away in the fifth to score Steve Kealey who had singled.

In the seventh Sharpe's single with one out was followed by a double by Danny Kling and a strikeout to Johnson, but Kendall again delivered a two-strike single to

bring home the two runs. Sharpe's fastball was crisp and he kept the opposition guessing with an effective changeup.

Powell led off the game with Mayfair's only hit and Shortstop Dick Horne followed with a base on balls. Sharpe retired the next three to get out of the jam. Only a second walk to Horne in the third inning interrupted Sharpe's string of 21 putouts. He had eight strikeouts.

Losing pitcher-Bill Gilliam, like Sharpe, had eight strikeouts and gave up two bases on balls.

Los Angeles' third round draft pick, Clark was inked to a one-year pact Thursday in Minneapolis by Laker Vice President and General Manager Lou Mohs.

A 6'2" guard, he averaged 24 points per game in his senior year, shot 47 per cent from the floor and 78 per cent from the freethrow line.

Described as an excellent playmaker, he also averaged six rebounds per game.

Clark is 24 years of age with his military obligation behind him, which was also one of the factors in his early selection.

He was one of nine players selected by the Lakers in Wednesday's annual NBA college draft—a session which left team management "elated" over the talent which they were able to obtain.

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
