Bruce Wade Gets 'Player of Year'

A Torrance All-City prep baseball team has been named by the Press-Herald. Selected as the "player of the year" is Bruce Wade, a North High senior who pitched, played the outfield and was a clutch hitter in the Bay League.

Jim O'Brien of North High is the "coach of the year." His team had a championship 15-3 record.

Nine other players who make up the all-city team include Pitchers Bob Sharpe of Torrance, Irl Davis and Tom Thomsen of Bishop Montgomery and Bruce Cooke of West.

Taking into consideration their all-around effectiveness in high school baseball, an outfield trio of Bruce Wade, Irl Davis, and Dave LaRoche was selected. LaRoche played first base, second base and pitched for West High.

Wade not only led the Bay League with 18 runs

Wade not only led the Bay League with 18 runs batted in, but his batting average was .352, his seasonal pitching record was 10-3, and he excelled playing North High's difficult left field.

Wade's top contributions for the Saxons' championship were best told in two crucial games against Santa Monica and Redondo. At the time the three schools were locked in a three-way bid for first place two-thirds through the season.

In an eight inning game against Santa Monica, both teams were engaged in a 7-7 showdown in the seventh.

Coach O'Brien sacrificed Wade's subsequent pitching assignment by using him in the eighth. Bruce gave up a run, but his single in the bottom of the inning figured in a 9-8 win.

Against Redondo Wade singled home the go-ahead run for a 4-3 lead in the ninth. He was rushed in to pitch in the bottom of the frame when Dave McCormick was injured after loading the bases with none away. A popup and double play gave Wade the save.

North finished the season with 11 straight victories before losing to San Bernardino Pacific in the CIF quarter-finials, Jeff Osborn batted 24-for-48 (.500) for North during the year.

West High tied El Segundo (13-2) in the Pioneer League standings, but the Warriors' lone win over Ei Segundo was a one-hitter by Bruce Cooke. Teammate Dave LaRoche concluded a four-year varsity career without winning a title or competing in the CIF playoffs. He was a team leader the four years.

Montgomery High won the Camino Real League title. Tom Thomsen was credited with two victories over runner up Crespi and Irl Davis was named the most valuable player in the league. He was a starting pitcher for four years for the Knights. Graham, a junior, has played shortstop since his freshman year.

South's Craig Moore batted .315, fielded .995, and was regarded the most spectacular third baseman in the school's history. South finished sixth in the Bay League with a 13-5 record.

Sharpe won a 5-0 one-hitter in the CIF playoffs against Mayfair and lost to Savanna, 1-0, in the quarter-finals.




