


Lyman Offers Voice for Torrance, Chairman Says

support Councilman David K. Lyman in his campaign for the state's new 32nd Senatorial District.

John Billings, Torrance chairman for the Lyman campaign, pointed out that Lyman offered Torrance residents the unique opportunity to have direct representation in the state legislature's upper house.

A MEMBER of the City Council since 1964, Lyman has a record of significant accomplishments during his term, Billings pointed out. He pointed to Lyman's role in obtaining more and better police protection, increased protection from fire loss, continued airport growth, and expanded recreational facilities.

In addition to his local activities, Lyman served as an

elector member of the city selection committee of the Southern California Rapid Transit District and is chairman of the City Council's public works committee, a member of the Parks and Recreation Committee, and a member of the public building committee.

Lyman, a practicing attorney, has served four years on the Los Angeles County Democratic Central Committee. He and his wife, Marion, and two daughters live in North Torrance.

Receiving sheepskins will be 2,486 eighth-graders, 1,837 high school seniors, and 211 adult school graduates.

Commencement exercises are set for Monday, June 13; Wednesday, June 15; and Thursday, June 16. Columbia School and the Torrance Adult Evening High School will hold ceremonies Monday. High school graduations will be Wednesday evening, and elementary graduations Thursday evening.





