State Approves College Police Science Course

Harbor College's police science program has been certified as exceeding the standards for certification established by the Commission on Peace Officer Standards and Training of the State Department of Justice.

The information was contained in a letter to President Wendell C. Black from Robert S. Seares, police chief of Arcadia and chairman of the commission.

The certification will permit Harbor College graduates to receive full credit for their class work in police and sheriff's departments throughout the state. It gives employing departments full assurance that basic requirements for peace officers set forth in the State Administrative Course have been fulfilled.

The commission congratulated Nicholas Zorotovich, chairman of the social science

division, of which the police science program is a part, "and the excellent staff of police science instructors for their outstanding contributions in up-grading the quality of California law enforcement."

Zorotovich, acknowledging the certification, said, "We are very proud of the recognition and certification. We have a very competent staff of police science instructors such as Lt. Rudolph V. DeLeon, Los Angeles Police Department; John J. Wolf, Los Angeles County Sheriff's Department; Uluse Schubach, Los Angeles Police Department; and Allen Bristow, instructor at California State College at Los Angeles, to name a few on the staff."
