Bank Schedules August
Opening for New Branch

Construction of a new
branch of Crocker-Citizens
National Bank, second largest
statewide bank in California,
is under way at the corner of
Hawthorne Boulevard and
Carson Street. Completion is
expected in August.

The new bank, to be lo-
cated in the 21-acre Bullock's
Fashion Square, is being built
by the Hinnewinkel Construc-
tion Co. of Gardena. It was
designed by Welton Becket
and Associates, Architects
and Engineers, of Los An-
geles.

"Crocker-Citizens is con-
tinuing its expansion to keep
pace with the unprecedented
growth of Southern Califor-

nia," according to S. Edgar
Lauther, executive vice presi-
dent of the bank. "We are
opening new or enlarged of-
fices in Southern California
at the rate of about one a
month."

Crocker-Citizens will have
more than 100 offices in the
Southland before the new
Fashion Square branch opens,
Lauther explained.

The new facility features a
clear-span structural steel
roof held aloft by four rec-
tangular columns, providing a
column-free banking floor
and mezzanine. Three sides
will feature special tinted
floor-to-ceiling glass.

The exterior is marked by
a broad overhang roof and
the floor, columns, and fascia
will be made of polished, im-
ported marble.
