

Lions Plan Second Football Game

Eleven Torrance Players Selected

Eleven graduating football players from high schools in Torrance will compete in the second Lions All-Star Football Game at El Camino Stadium Thursday, Aug. 4.

Selected as participants are Kent Major and Steve Schmitz from North High; Bob Sharpe and Terry Tiedeman from Torrance High; Ron Kammerer from South; Mike Leamy, Dan Gillespie and Mike Wood from Bishop Montgomery; and Len Muellich, Scott Steele and Jack Sturnacle of West High.

Two 30-man teams from 24 schools were named to the East-West classic.

The mid-summer prep football game is played for the benefit of the Southwest Association of Retarded Children.

Don Banker, outgoing president of the sponsoring West Torrance Lions Club, said a kickoff luncheon will be held July 29 in conjunction with the South Bay Athletic Club meeting.

Coaches of the West team are Ron Terry of Palos Verdes and George Hartman of El Segundo. Handling the East squad are Jack Bobinette of Narbonne and Bob Biaz of Fermin Lasuen. They will start practice July 20.

Originally the coaches picked a minimum of two and a maximum of three boys from each school, but following withdrawals and replacements, three schools—Redondo, Palos Verdes and Gardena—are represented by four players.

Coach Terry of P.V. will have four men who led his varsity to the CIF "AA" championship a year ago. They are All-CIF back Bill Tapp, All-Pioneer League backs Gary Bilotti and Lloyd Miller, and guard Mark Carpenter.

Bay League runner-up Redondo placed Dana Clyde, Steve Atwater, Larry Etow and Bruce Winnie on the West squad.

Marine League champion Gardena will head the East squad with John Denham, Guy Draper, Bruce Fryar and Tenny Warren.

Leading candidate for quarterback for each team are Phil Smyth of Fermin Lasuen for the East and Dave Chauncey of Hawthorne for the West.

Chauncey broke his leg early in the Bay League campaign last fall and missed five league games. Smyth ran the Lasuen offense during his junior and senior years.

Dropped from the original Lions game roster are Jay Stuart of South and Ralph Gambin of Mira Costa whose other commitments prevent them from competing, it has been reported.
