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Business Is Good!

Thrift Shop In Upward Swing

"Antiques? Well, we have a few, but our stock is mostly just useful clothes and household necessities," says Mrs. Leo B. Mayer, chairman of the Thrift Shop, operated by the Auxiliary of the Little Company of Mary Hospital. The shop, at 15441 Hawthorne Blvd., in Lawndale, is open Wednesdays through Saturdays from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. and is staffed by volunteers, who collect salable items from Palos Verdes to Santa Monica.

Mrs. Chesmore Eastlake, a doctor's wife, says "I can get my friends to donate items of quality, beautiful things, why the children's clothes have hardly been worn. If anything needs mending or cleaning we volunteers do it."

A longtime worker at the shop, Mrs. George Olivieri (who was president of the auxiliary last year) says: "One of the reasons that I enjoy working here is that I admire the clever way some of these young mothers buy. There is a woman who comes in here who tells me that she can buy an item of clothing for each one of her six children for about the amount that she would have to pay for one item brand new. People tell us that they are glad we opened this shop."

Co-chairman of the shop, Mrs. C. L. Fox, points out that baby items, kitchenwares and small household appliances are much in demand at thrift shop prices. "Now that we have been here since September our group of regular customers is being built up. Things don't stay in stock long," she said.

Although the shop has yet to show much of a profit, the women working in it hope to be able to realize a sum of money to go for the purchase of a gift for the hospital in Torrance. The auxiliary has pledged to give the radiology department the latest thing in equipment. This piece of equipment, a television X-ray unit, reduces radiation dosage and thus is important for both patient and radiologist. It also improves the visual sharpness or acuteness of the image. Another advantage is that the television feature is valuable for use in consultation between two or more doctors, and also in teaching.

Future Bride

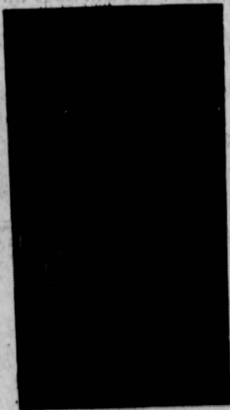
Hart - Nelson
