

# New Golf Course Improvements In

To make the new Victoria Park Golf Course one of the most challenging in the nation, several fully grown palm trees will be planted on the course under development near Gardena at 190th Street and Avalon.

The 20-to-30-foot-high palm trees will be planted strategically on the course to provide a good test of golfing skill for professionals and duffers alike.

The trees were obtained by the County at no cost because they will be removed as part of a nearby street-widening project.

Supervisor Kenneth Hahn pioneered construction of golf courses to meet the recreational needs of the County. It will be a full-length 18-hole golf course.

Like several other County courses, Victoria Park is financed at no cost to the taxpayers by the County Retirement Board.

The Retirement Board, which serves as a "bank account" for County employees, will lease the course back to the County and green fees will pay back the investment.

Hahn began this method of financing with Western Avenue Golf Course (120th Street and Western) in 1954. Green fees at the Western Avenue facility made it possible for the course to pay for itself by 1962.

"Through this method of financing," Hahn said, "additional recreational facilities can be provided the citizens of Los Angeles County to be paid for by the people who use them."

Hahn also announced that more than 1,800 feet of 30-foot-high fencing has been installed at Western Avenue Golf Course to protect nearby homes and passing motorists from "bad tee shots."

Hahn called for the higher fencing to provide maximum protection from flying golf balls for nearby areas.

He pointed out the old fencing has been salvaged and put to use at other County parks and playgrounds.

## FUN and FACTS About Bowling.....by Dick Erickson



**PUSHAWAY:** A maneuver employed by the smooth bowler. A pleasant chore necessitated by the proximity of adoring fans.

**PUSHAWAY:** A smooth pushaway insures a smooth delivery. From a proper stance, the ball moves out and the right foot moves forward at approximately the same time. The length of the first step is determined by the length of the pushaway. If a bowler is taking a rather large, even awkward, first step, he corrects this by cutting back on the energy he puts into his pushaway—smoothing out his entire delivery. The pushaway starts the bowler into motion. Therefore, it is extremely important.

## Fish, Game Regulations Tightened

A new regulation adopted June 24 by the California Fish and Game Commission requires hunters and fishermen to keep their hunting or fishing licenses in possession while pursuing either of those sports, the Department of Fish and Game reports.

The new regulation, which became effective on July 2, along with the 1966 hunting seasons, reads as follows: "Every person while hunting or fishing shall have a valid hunting or fishing license on his person or in his immediate possession."

The "immediate possession" phrase was included as a convenience for people like clammers or skin divers who might not want to carry their license into the water with them. If they have it in the car nearby, or in their pocket on the beach, it can be produced to satisfy the regulation.

"If it's in the glove compartment of the car in Ventura, and you're clamming at Pismo Beach, you're in trouble," the DFG said.

## Parsons To Stage Indy-type Races

Johnnie Parsons of Van Nuys, 1950 Indianapolis 500-mile race winner announced he will bring the Indianapolis-type sprint cars of the California Racing Association to Gardena's Ascot Park for a weekly series of Wednesday night racing programs starting July 13.

Heading the fifty car field for the opening night program on the only half-mile banked dirt track in Southern California, will be CRA point leader Don Thomas of El Cajon, piloting his own Chevrolet V8 powered machine in the night's eight-event racing program.

Thomas, who has won three CRA features already this year has a 24½ point lead over Frank Secriest of Bakersfield going into this Wednesday evening's 30-lap main event. Secriest will drive the Miller Chevrie special from Bellflower in which he has a single CRA main event win.

Other top threat drivers entered for the opener include Paul Jones of Torrance and Bob Hogle of Buena Park both driving Offenhauser powered machines.

Hogle is the 1963 CRA driving champ, while Jones is the younger brother of 1963 Indianapolis winner Parnelli Jones. Each has a pair of CRA SprintCar main event wins on the circuit this year.

Other driving stars entered include Bruce Walkup of Downey; Ned Spath of Ojai; Dick Fries of San Diego; Steve Kennick of Temple City; Jay West of Colton; Billy Wilkerson of El Monte; Jim Wood of Romona; Jack DeArmond of Baldwin Park; Stan McElrath of No. Hollywood; and Marty Kinerk of Tucson all driving Chevrolet and Ford powered racers.
