The champion of the South Bay Connie Mack League will be either the Torrance Red Devils or the Tordena Bullets again.

The Red Devils won their 12th straight ball game Sunday to hold a one-game lead over the Bullets. Falling three games off the pace is Hawthorne which split a pair of games last weekend.

The Red Devils kept their win streak alive by edging Beach Cities' Riddle and Ross team, 6-5, and San Pedro, 7-5.

The Bullets grabbed three victories, downing Inglewood, 6-3 and 13-2, and winning a forfeit from Long Beach. Inglewood led Tordena, 2-0, going into the top of the fifth, but Chris Krogh homered for a three-run rally. Dave LaRoche cashed in a home run in the seventh.

The second game against Inglewood was knotted at 1-1 in the fourth before the Bullets busted it wide open. Marty Morris, Darrell Blore and Sass hit home runs.

The game against Long Beach was ruled forfeited by the umpire in the seventh inning. The score was 7-0 at the time.

Kenny Pfau and Bob Sharpe hurled victories for the Red Devils. Fred Kendall got a home run and double in the San Pedro win.

Second Gold Cup Eyed by 'Driver'

Hollywood Park's 55-day thoroughbred racing season reaches its traditional high point Saturday when the "track of the lakes and flowers" presents the 27th running of the world famed \$162,100 Hollywood Gold Cup at a mile and one-quarter for three-year-olds and up.

First of the nation's classics to guarantee the winner a net purse of \$100,000, the Hollywood Gold Cup has gained acclaim as the "Race of Champions" in recognition of its brilliant role of victors.

Native Diver, who clinched "Horse of the Meeting" laurels a year ago with a wire-to-wire romp in the Gold Cup, will return in search of an unprecedented second straight victory.

Packing topweight of 126 pounds, Native Diver again will be confronted by Hughes and Dimick's rags-to-riches Travel Orb, his conqueror in the recent \$56,750 American Handicap and leading pretender to the 'Driver's' throne. Travel Orb, Washington-bred son of Perambulator who also accounted for the \$120,100 Californian this season, is in the Gold Cup with 118 pounds.

Other prospects for the event include Meadowbrook Stables' Tronador, Mr. and Mrs. E. B. Johnston's Real Good Deal, Golden Tan Stable's Sheldrake, Wilbud Stadelman's Aurelius II and Perne L. Grissom's Carpenter's Rule.

Lone supplementary nominee to this year's Hollywood Gold Cup is the fleet three-year-old, Barry J. Richard's Tragniew, who was made eligible at a fee of \$7,500. Only Kerr Stables' great Round Table has even been able to win the Gold Cup as a three-year-old, a feat he accomplished in 1957.

The Hollywood Gold Cup guarantees the winner \$102,100, with secondary awards of \$30,000 second, \$20,000 to third and \$10,000 fourth.

Registration should be completed by 6:45 p.m.

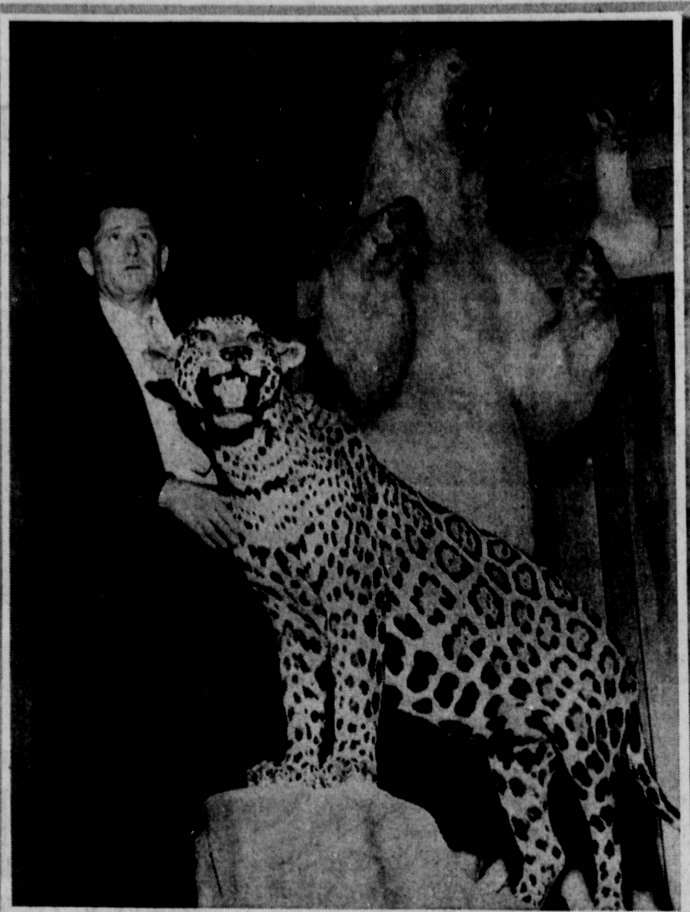

Fans of the big Indy-type autos are beginning to wonder after the El Cajon speedster raced to his third straight feature victory on the Valley third-mile oval last weekend.

While other drivers have tussled with the high banked turn, Thomas has handled it like a teeter-totter, zipping up the 17 degree rise out of the straightaway and coming down in front of the pack.

He bided his time this trip, hanging two car lengths behind Norm Wiles of Bakersfield, who led for the first 15 laps. 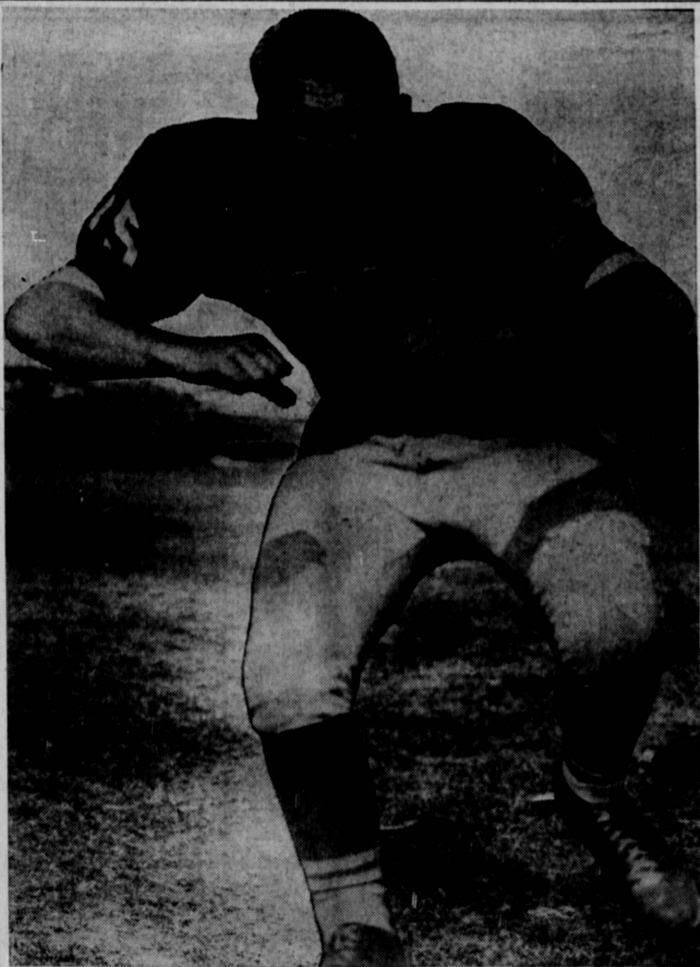
The 19-year-old catcher played for the Giant Rookies before being assigned to Twin Falls of the Pioneer League.
