Tire Failure Result of Neglect

"Unsafe Tires Are Killers," to the need to safety check the sign reads, and the car parked next to the sign is proof of the truth of that statement.

The tires on that car, now parked at the B. F. Goodrich store at Cravens and Post avenues in downtown Torrance, failed on the Harbor Freeway. The driver, a passenger, and the driver of a second car died in the resulting crash.

Purpose of the display, according to William C. "Bill" Heede, local B. F. Goodrich manager, is to call attention

checked regularly, but they fail to care for tires.

In their efforts to improve tire safety, Heede and his staff will safety-check tires and the suspension system of any car—free. They'll advise you about the correct air pressure and other pertinent facts about tire care.

Heede, manager of the local store for the past six months, said the accident involving the car he now displays could have been avoided—and three lives saved—if the simple, quick check had been completed.

Heede said most tire trouble occurs when tires are "90 per cent worn." Most people, he adds, wouldn't think of not having the oil in their cars

tal cut-off, and horizontal discharge, officials said.

The continuous process eliminates several intermediate steps used in traditional steelmaking. The conventional process used at the plant's open-hearth furnaces includes the pouring of molten steel into ingot molds, cooling, mold removal, reheating of the ingot, and the primary rolling. In the new system, molten steel will flow through formers and through the primary formers in one operation.

The steel plant, one of the city's early industries, occupies a large area at Border and Van Ness avenues. The new facility will be constructed right at the present plant area, the Press-Herald was told.

through the formation of a Torrance Community Hospital Advisory Board. Membership on the advisory board will be made up of community leaders, former board members, and others, according to the merger agreement.

TORRANCE Hospital Association was formed in 1920 to carry out the terms of the trust of Jared Sidney Torrance, founder of the city. The hospital was constructed in 1924 and opened with 32 beds in 1925. It now is rated a 99-bed hospital.

Riviera Community Hospital was opened in 1957 and was reorganized in 1961 and operated since by the same corporation. It is rated a 96-bed hospital.

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
