

Laker Schedule Set for '66-67

The home basketball schedule for the Los Angeles Lakers' 1966-67 NBA season has been announced by General Manager Lou Mohs. The Laker's home base will be the Sports Arena.

There will be 40 games on the Laker home schedule and 41 on the road, whereas next year there will be 41 home game and 40 on the road.

San Francisco, New York, Baltimore, Cincinnati and Detroit will play four times in the Sports Arena against five times in their home cities.

Boston, Philadelphia, St. Louis and Chicago will play five times in the Sports Arena as against four in their respective cities.

There is no change in the starting times of the games. Weekday games will begin at 8:30 and Sunday games at 7:05.

The Laker season ticket sales are 5% ahead of the total sales for last year. Season ticket renewals have all been taken care of and new applicants and prospects are being contacted.

Hungry for Some Fried Grunion?

Those elusive little grunion are expected to stage their last four-night spawning run of the year on the sandy ocean beaches of southern California starting Tuesday night, says the Department of Fish and Game.

Runs lasting one to two hours each are expected to begin about 11:20 p.m. Tuesday, 12 midnight Wednesday, 1 a.m. Thursday night and 2 a.m. Friday night.

Grunion may be taken on the beach or in the surf by hand only. It is unlawful to trap the fish by digging holes in the sand. A sportfishing license is required for persons 16-years-old or over.

Other than the license, a grunion seeker needs nothing but patience, fortitude, sharp eyes, good luck, old clothes, a willingness to get wet, and a burlap sack or other container to hold the fish.
