LEMON FROMASH DESERT

2 eggs 2 1/2 c whipping cream
1 1/4 cup sugar 1 tbs boiling water
1/2 lemon peel 1 pkg. plain gelatin
juice of lemon

Whip egg yolks and sugar until white and fluffy. Dissolve gelatin in hot water and mix in juice. Whip cream and egg whites. Add lemon peel to the egg yolk mixture. Add gelatin and stir until it thickens. Quickly and carefully stir in the whipped cream and egg whites. Pour the fromash into a dish and let stand in a cool place for 1 to 3 hours, until stiff. Loosen the sides and turn out on platter. Decorate with whipped cream and finely sliced almonds.
