### Employed in California

### Hits Record

Employment at a record high and unemployment well below the year-ago level were among the highlights of the June economic picture in California as painted today by the departments of Industrial Relations and Employment.

Total civilian employment reached a high of 7,198,000 last month, up by 301,000, or 4.4 percent, from June, 1965, and 74,000 from the previous record set this May, according to Ernest B. Webb, director of industrial relations.

The over-the-year gain included growth in all major categories with the exception of agriculture and construction. Manufacturing accounted for three out of every ten new jobs added in the past year.

The four-industry aerospace complex with more than 530,000 workers set a new record, now having surpassed its previous high of December, 1962.

Between May and June, the advance in total civilian employment was a little short of seasonal in size because of relatively small expansion in agricultural employment together with the restraining effect of some work stoppages, including the Greyhound strike.

Trade, services, and manufacturing were leaders in size of over-the-month gain, the last two industries chalking up all-time highs. Most manufacturing categories added workers, with the largest upswings a seasonal one in lumber and further rises in the aerospace segment.

The number of jobless in California was 380,000 in June, 76,000 under the year-ago level of 456,000, announced Albert B. Tieburg, director of employment.

The seasonally adjusted unemployment rate was 4.7 percent in June, well below the 5.8 percent rate of June last year, and unchanged from the May level. This marked the eleventh consecutive month that California's unemployment rate has been under the year-ago level.

The airman is a graduate of South High School.

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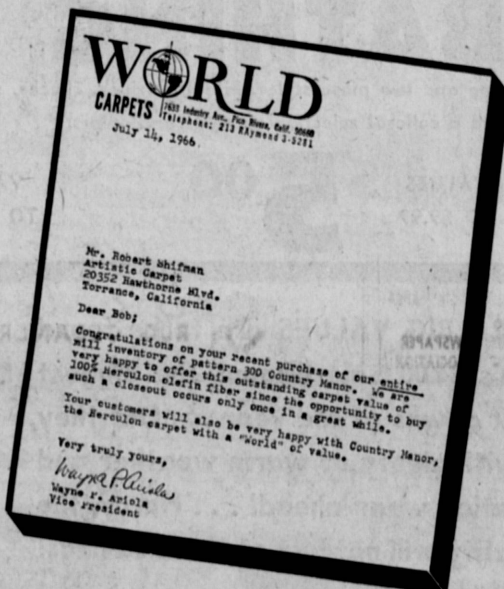
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
