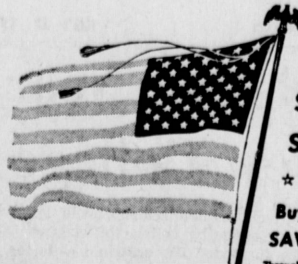
Ludwig, in this third year at Berkeley majoring in architecture, is a 1962 graduate of South High School.
