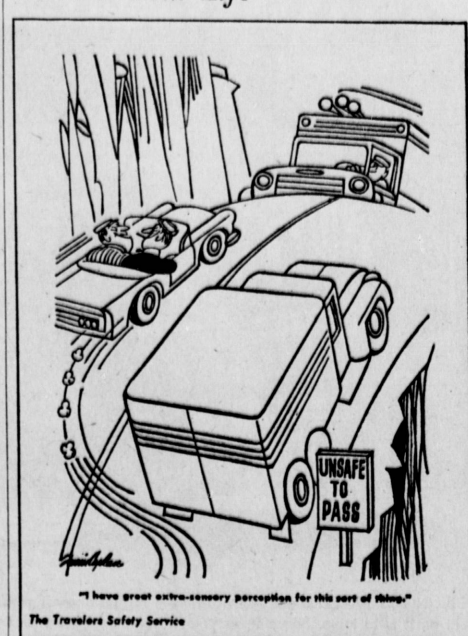

Registration at College Slated

Registration for the four-week post summer session at El Camino College will be held Friday, Aug. 5, with classes scheduled to begin Monday, Aug. 8.

Continuing students—those who attended El Camino during the spring semester—will register from 8:30 to 9:30 a.m. New and former students are scheduled to register from 10 to 11 a.m.

Registration will be restricted to legal residents of the El Camino College District and Gardena. Out-of-state residents now living within the college district will be accepted for enrollment, but should anticipate a tuition fee of \$10.40 per unit—to be paid at the time of registration, according to Leo M. Christian, dean of admissions.

PLACEMENT tests, if required, must be completed at least five school days prior to registration, Christian added. Reservations for these tests may be made in the counseling office.

Students registering for the post session will be limited to four units.

"Anyone planning to enroll should remember that summer sessions concentrate in a very short period of time the equivalent of a full semester of academic work. The average student, in order to make a grade of C, must expect to devote a minimum of two hours of study for every hour in class," Christian stated.

NO TUITION will be charged to residents of the college district. Students must be 18 years of age or older, or a high school graduate.

Non-California high school graduates must comply with the California state law regarding poliomyelitis immunization prior to registration. Classes will end Sept. 2. The regular fall semester begins Sept. 12.

Approximately 5,000 students are currently enrolled in the six-week summer session which ends Aug. 3.

Constitution Revision Measure Wins Approval

The California Constitution Revision Commission has endorsed Proposition 1-a on the November ballot, Judge Bruce W. Sumner, chairman, has announced.

Proposition 1-a covers the commission's recommendations shortening and making substantive changes in about a third of the 80,000-word California State Constitution. If approved by voters, the changes would eliminate some 16,000 words.

Revised are Article III (Separation of Powers), Article IV (Legislative), Article V (Executive) and Article VI (Judicial), Judge Sumner said.

Major changes include a call for an annual general session of the Legislature and simplified initiative and referendum processes. It also would allow members of the Legislature to set their own salaries.

The revision also would delete the long list of succession to the office of governor and would give the Supreme Court the right to determine questions of disability of the governor and a vacancy in the governor's office.

The commission, composed of 69 state leaders, was created in 1962 following a 2-40-1 vote of the people.

Law School to Open Campus in Torrance

The University of West Los Angeles School of Law will open a Torrance campus in September, according to Dr. Wallace Frank, dean of the school.

Formed by local educators, the University is a non-profit institution staffed by local attorneys. Persons interested in a career in law may apply for admission at the Torrance office, 3679 Torrance Blvd., Suite 102.

The University has been chartered by the state to grant law degrees to graduates who will then be eligible to take the State Bar Examination.

A total of eight full scholarships, valued at more than \$5,000, will be offered by the school. Tuition is \$180 per semester of \$20 per unit of classroom work. A bulletin of classes may be obtained at the school from 8:30 to 11:30 a.m. daily or from 6:30 to

8:30 p.m. evenings. Applicants must have a minimum of two years of college credits (60 units) or be 23 years of age and pass an entrance examination.
