Bipartisan support for the suggestion was voiced by committee members. members.

THE SENATE Judiciary Committee has scheduled meetings in late July on two matters, the operations of California's jury system, and on additional control measures to curb dangerous drug abuse. The Senate Education Committee has set a two-day Committee has set a two-day hearing to gather further ma-terial on problems of local school district organization. On the Assembly side, the Subcommittee on School Ef-ficiency and Economy is hold-ing a two-day session in San Jose on the tough problem caused by a recent opinion of the Attorney-General af-fecting school board mem-bers. The opinion holds gen-erally that board members bers. The opinion holds gen-erally that board members are personally liable if they permit use of school build-ings which do not comply with the earthquake safety requirements imposed by the Field Act passed in 1933. This law had no retroactive effect and many school buildeffect, and many school build-ings constructed before its passage are still in use.

## Motorists **Favor CHP** Inspection

"Nine out of ten motorists who have commented survey card about the pas ented by

survey card about the passen-ger vechicle inspection pro-gram of the California High-way Patrol have expressed favor," Bradford M. Crittend-en, California Highway Patrol Commissioner, said today. "In the first two months of the program's operation 5,082 survey cards were returned." Crittenden said. "Of these 1,530 were favorable, com-pared to 180 unfavorable. The remainder contained either no comment or irrelevant re-marks." marks."

Cars are only stopped for observed violations and so far a quarter of a million have been stopped and inspected. Almost 100,000 have been in violation of at least one of the 12 items inspected by the CHP.

The most common item in violation are lights, followed by mufflers, horn, brakes, windshield wipers, rear-view mirrors, glass, tires and wheels and the pollution con-trol device. There have also
