

We are once again in that season that the various types of mites are more of a problem than ever.

If you are growing tomatoes and your leaves are curling, it is most likely the tomato mite. For these and all other mites use a Kelthane product specially made for red spider and all mites, it can be mixed and used with a vegetable spray because Kelthane is safe on tomatoes up to 2 days before harvest. This product is also widely used on begonias, african violets and other tender plants.

If yor are cheeking for mites, remove one of the infected leaves and shake it over a piece of white paper. You will see the tiny specks moving over the white surface if there are any mites.
