The entrants are judged in the categories of humor, originality, beauty and a fourth category called "spontaneous" for the spur-of-themoment or late entrants, There is a sweepstakes for the over-all winner.

Television coverage of the show has been scheduled again this year by Channei 11. KTTV. on Saturday from 2 to 4 p.m.

Tickets for the event will be on sale at gaily decorated booths. Box seats will be available both Saturday and Sunday.
