Aboard SS Princess Oct. 7

A Moonlight Cruise, reminiscent of the Mississippi river boat days, is in store for members of the Las Colinas Garden Club, their husbands and guests on Oct. 7.

The refurbished SS Princess, a luxurious party ship of the elegant turn-of-the-century era, anchored at berth 67 in the Los Angeles Harbor, will be the scene of the Fantasy Cruise. Guests will board the ship at 10 p.m. to enjoy cocktails, hors d'oeuvres and dancing.

Numerous dinner parties are planned for the earlier evening at harbor restaurants prior to boarding the liner. The party will be held in the Silver Bar room and guests will have the opportunity of touring the ship with its red velvet, crystal chandeliers and wrought iron decor recalling America's "elegant" era.

Mrs. Sidney Greene, the club's ways and means chairman, is serving as general chairman of the benefit Moonlight Cruise. She is being assisted by Mmes. Max Melwing, Douglas Adams, and Gregory Vore. Proceeds from the cocktail dansant will be used for City Beautification.

Gala Festival Date Near

A gala weekend in Greece is promised South Bay residents by the St. Katherine Ladies Philoptochos Society when they present their two day Greek Festival on Oct. 1 and 2 at the Torrance Recreation Center, Torrance Blvd. and Madrona Ave.

Hours for this second annual event are Saturday, Oct. 1, from 11 a.m. to 8 p.m. and Sunday from 1 p.m. to 6 p.m. This unique festival will benefit the St. Katherine Greek Orthodox Church in Redondo.

This year's Festival will offer more features than the 1965 event, which attracted hundreds from the southland. There is no admission.

A combination dinner will be offered consisting of a variety of Greek foods, souvlakia (lamb on a skewer), pilafe, pastitso, dolmathes (stuffed grape leaves), tiropetes (cheese turnovers), Kefthetes (meatballs), salad and the famous Greek sesame bread.

The Hellenic Dance Troupe, with their Evzone costume will perform both days presenting native Greek dances. Booths

will offer for sale objects of art from Greece, records, recipe books, children's games and Greek pastries.

Sotiros Chianis, an ethnomusicologist at UCLA, will play the cymbalom and Mrs. Louise Anderson, also of UCLA, will lead many of the authentic Greek dances.

In addition, Evzones and girls dressed in native costumes, will act as hosts and hostesses, with Greek music and dancing continuously in the background. The Evzones are soldiers, who act as the honor guard at the royal palace and the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier in Athens. The colorful costumes are copied from the Greek mountain fighters.

One of the most popular features of the 1965 Festival, which will be repeated again this year, is the Greek Kafenio, where guests may sit and enjoy coffee as they watch the dancing. Major prize to be awarded is a color television set.
