the forrance community is playing host to students from four foreign lands—Scotland, Turkey, Germany, and The Netherlands—here under the sponsorship of the Torrance Chapter, American Field

Service.

During this year in America, these students are attending Torrance High schools and are making their homes with local families, becoming acquainted with the American way of life.

Including the year of 1966, the Torrance AFS Chapter has brought 40 teenagers from 26 foreign lands, since its organization in 1954. Under the "Americans Abroad" program, the chapter has sent 21 local students to 12 foreign countries.

Here from Edinburgh, Scotland is Miss Elizabeth McChlery, who is attending North High School and making her home with Mr. and Mrs. Clarence Janeba. Elizabeth is the chapter's first Scottish student.

The first female AFS student to attend West High is Miss Selda Ustertunali of Eskisehir, Turkey. At home with the Jack Erving family, she has a foster sister, Leslie and a foster brother, Dale. Selda plans to major in chemical engineering. She has a sister Serpil, 19, and a brother, Selcuk living in Eskisehir.

Weisbaden, Germany is represented by Miss Barbara Patzek, who is attending Torrance High and living with the Fred Fleming family. Barbara's mother is a widow and she has no brothers or sisters but in America she has two sisters, Pamela, student at USC, who was an Americans Abroad student to Germany three years ago, and Susan Fleming, a freshman at Torrance. The chapter is now screening applicants for the Americans Abroad program from four Torrance High schools.

Over 15,000 top teenagers from over the United States will be competing for placements on both the summer and school year programs.

For each AFS student placed, the chapter must pay the participating contribution of \$750 per student. This amount helps to pay for transportation, bus trip at the end of the year, allowances and medical expenditures.

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The 64 guests greeted the celebrants and showered them with gifts.


A champagne toast was given followed by cocktails and hors d'oeuvres. An eve-
