South Grad May Get Hero's Medal

"He's been a hero today." "He's been a hero today." Those words, spoken to as-sure a worried mother, proved true—but few knew it until just a few days ago. The speaker was Joe Wil-cox, executive secretary of the Torrance Family MMCA. He was talking about Marine Pfc. Peter Mora, a 19-year-lod graduate of South High, who has been recommended for the Marine Corps Medal. The truth of Wilcox's prophecy was revealed wednesday afternoon when the aircraft carrier USS Oris-

kany slid slowly and sadly into San Diego harbor. The Oriskany sailed five months ago for duty off the coast of Viet Nam, but her stay was shortened by a deadly fire which left 46 officers and men dead. Another 12 officers and men who sailed with Oriskany died or are reported missing in patrol and air strikes in Viet Nam. Pic. Mora was not on board the Oriskany when she imped

Pfc, Mora was not on board the Oriskany when she limped into port Wednesday. He was left behind in Subie Bay, Philippines, where he is re-covering from third degree burns on his hands.

The 19-year-old Marine was a guard in the forward flight deck when magnesium flares, stored near the officers' quar-ters in the forward flight hangar, caught fire and ex-toded.
