Aerospace Executive
To Direct Boy Scouts**

William W. Drake, vice president-administration and treasurer of the Aerospace Corp. of El Segundo, has been named to a second term as chairman of the Centinela Valley District of the Boy Scouts of America.

As Boy Scout chairman, he will continue to coordinate all activities of the 5,000 scouts, cubs, and explorers in the Centinela Valley area.
