For the buffet table, a tall For the buffet table, a tall harvest arrangement might feature sheaves of wheat, bronze and yellow-colored chrysanthemums and pom-pons, ears of Indian corn, and branches of autumn leaves. The sheaves of wheat form the framework of the arrangement. They are criss-crossed, bound together, and placed in an upright position.

The chrysanthemums and pompons cover the junction of the wheat and fill in the spaces between the upright wheat stalks. A few ears of Indian corn, branches of brown leaves, and individual leaves are placed around

The bottom of the arrange-ment. The brilliant bronze and yellow - colored chrysanthe-mums and pompons typify the rich hues of harvest time and harmonize with any color scheme.

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Your neighborhood florist has a wide variety of chry-santhemums in numerous colors for your table an d home — large, fluffy ones; daisy types, spider-like Fuji mums; and the small, spray-type chrysanthemums called pompons.
