The special service, being offered for the 22nd consecutive year, will cost \$2.75 per person for the round trip. Buses will leave from the Torrance City Hall, 3031 Torrance Blvd., at 7:15 a.m. Jan. 2 and return immediately after the parade.

The chamber has secured grandstand seats along the parade route. Tickets are \$6 per person and may be purchased from the chamber at 1510 Cravens Ave.
