# Knights Collide with Morningside



### Attractions in Prep Football

It is almost impossible to pick a winner among the remaining few teams in the CIF football playoffs. The front office of the CIF began drooling over the compe tition and talent before most of the league championships were decided.

According to the script, however, Centennial was supposed to reach the finals of the "AAAA" playoffs and renew its battle with defending champion Mater Dei.

Centennial's Mickey Cureton, heading for a new scoring record of more than 237 points, would go against a Mater Dei team that sailed through two seasons without a loss (23-0-1) and had lost only five games in six years. Nothing could possibly prevent this attraction,

But in a game against an equally marvelous Lake-wood team, Centennial was upset in the rain Friday, 16-13, and Cureton settled for one touchdown and a point total of 240.

Glenn Davis, now the former all-time one season prep scoring king, watched Cureton race 88 yards through mud and rain for the touchdown which boosted his point total to 240, four more than Davis scored in 1942 while at Bonita High.

Davis visited Cureton after the CIF quarter-final game against Lakewood and congratulated the prep star, then told reporters:

"I'm delighted he broke the record. He broke it on a sensational run, typical of his play all year.

Twenty-four years is a long time for any record to stand. I'm only sorry they (Centennial) lost. I'd like this to be a happy evening for Mickey. Winning would have meant more than any record. meant more than any record.

"I wish him lots of luck in his college career. I hope he'll go to school in the Southern California area so we can have many more thrills watching him play."

Davis after scoring 236 points in 1942 to conclude 54 his prep career, went on to become Mr. Outside at Army, winner of the Heisman Trophy and a pro star with the 72 Los Angeles Rams. Los Angeles Rams.

With two more games Cureton was expected to run the record out of sight. The championship game would have filled the Coliseum.

But although Commissioner Ken Fagans lost his 22 moneymaking attraction, the remaining contenders should receive great support from their more local

### Two Unbeaten (11-0) Powerhouses Tangle at El Camino on Friday

It has been three weeks since the men were separated from the boys and the best prep football teams in the Southland began competing for laurels in the CIF playoffs Two familiar teams from this part of the country which can hold their heads high after whipping 11 straight opponents are Bishop Montgomery High of the Camino Real League and Morningside of the Sky League.

These two undefeated league champions come face-to-face Friday in a semi-final round game of the CIF "AAA" playoffs. The game will be at El Camino's Murdock Stadium at 8 p.m.

Morningside's 11 victories include a 48-14 playoff win over Sierra and a 26-6 win over Santa Fe last Friday, Montgomery, in the same series, has beaten Rancho Alamitos, 41-20, and Magnolia, 24-7

34-7.

Eleven opponents have been unable to stop Morningside's running game. The Monarchs were tabbed at the outset of the season to win the Sky League. The team's best running threat, all-league Everett Marshall, was not listed on the first string at the time. The man most responsible for Morningside's all-around thrust is Quarterback Jim Bouton who likes to run with the ball himself and excels as a defensive back. He also ran for two TDs against Santa Fe.

Among the team's quick linemen are all-Sky League tackle Harvey McGee, guard Tom Stolarz, and end-halfback Reynolds.

The Monarchs' starting lineup will consist of Tom Teague and Dennis Goff at end, McGee and Steve Johannes at tackle, Jeff Bettinger and Ron Nelson at guard, Dave Neff at center, and backs Bouton, Marshall, Ron Hastings, and Tom Stolarz.

Montgomery's starting offense will have Rich Sidbeck and Steve Patterson at end, Mike McClain and Mark Leamy at tackle, Charlie Reade and Richard Pipkin at guard, Nelson Straley at center, Danny Graham at quarterback, Bob Comstock at halfback, Chuck Bongard at I-back, and Ed Gilles at Rullback Gilles at fullback.

Filling in on defense are linebacker Pat Kealey, guard Ralph Mishler, tack-le Mike Bruccoleri, defensive ends John Sullivan and Ray Vida, and de-fensive backs Dan Pritchett and Mike

Coach George Swade said credit goes to offensive guard Richard Pip-kin and tackle Mike McClain for open-ing up Montgomery's running game. "These boys have done a fine job this year," said Swade.

Asked how he felt about the rainy weather, Swade said, "We would like to throw more against Morningside than we did against Magnolia."

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The Knights were unable to work out on Monday, but plans call for the team to spend as much time as possible on the practice field this week.

The Knights had to rally in the third and fourth quarter of their games against Rancho Alamitos and Magnolia to win convincingly. The team's blocking, together with key runs by Fullback Gilles and QB Graham, led to both victories. ham, led to both victories.

Passing-wise, Graham has 98 com-pletions in 163 attempts. He has 1,642 yards passing and 25 touchdown tosses.


