Dodgers Get **Facelifting**

In what probably represents the greatest turnove of playing personnel on a championship club in the history of baseball, the Dodgers today released a roster which showed a 32 percent turnover since the World Series and a 35 percent change since the Spring roster

Eight players who were eligible for the October Classic against the Baltimore Orioles are no longer listed among active Dodgers.

Missing are Sandy Koufax, Maury Wills, Jim Gilliam, Nate Oliver, Dick Stuart (who will be offered a contract when a spot on the roster is opened), Jim Barbieri, Wes Covington and Tommy Davis.

Fourteen players who were on the roster as the Dodgers prepared for Florida maneuvers last Spring have moved from the Los Angeles picture—the afore-mentioned Koufax, Wills, Davis and Oliver as well as Johnny Podres, John Purdin, Skip Hancock, Howie Reed, Nick Willhite, Dale Williams, Hector Valle, Bart Shirley, Derrell Griffith and Bill Parlier.
