With an expected 800 entries and an attendance of more than 7,000, the Peninsula Committee of the Children's Hospital has announced that the 1967 Portuguese Bend National Horse Show will be held this year on Sept. 23 and 24 at the Portuguese Bend Riding Club, Mrs. Ernest W. Hahn, chairman, is being assisted by Mrs. Stephen F. Hinchliffe, Jr, and Mrs. Paul E. Morgan, Mrs. Frederick R. Reed is president of the Peninsula Committee.

For this largest two-day show in the country, Allen Ross will serve as manager and announcer, Judges will be George W. Jayne of Illnois, for hunters, jumpers and hunt seat; Russell B. Franklin, Fresno, western and stock seat; and Bill Wyse, Ventura, saddle and walking horses, saddle seat, and profiles.

The All Junior Show on Saturday, oper to riders under the age of 18 years, will in clude three American Horse Show Association medal classes among twenty classes Winners of the medal classes, provide they have won one additional medal within the year, are eligible to enter competition in the national finals in the fall. The AHS. Hunt Seat medal was won by Miss Lar Ellison of Rolling Hills last year. The Sat dle Seat Medal Class went to Keit Schramm of Pasadena and Virginia Hale of Ventura took first place in the stocseat medal class.

Trophies presented on Saturday include the Frank A. Vanderlip Perpetual Trophy for high point in all classes, junior riders; and the Col. John Kimbail Brown High Point Hunter Seat Trophy. Miss Sasan Hutchinson of San Marino won both trophies last year. Other trophy sponsors are Messrs, and Mines. William Rule, Andrew Shaw, Charles I. Classes deleted are the Fine Harness Hors Stake and the Parade Horse Stake.

Another popular event slated for Sunday during intermission is the children's parade. This event challenges the children, 12 year and under, to create original costumes for themselves and their animals. They are judged for humor, originality and heauty. There is a sweepstakes for the over-all winner.

Family participation is an important phase of the show. Working five days a week, families are now refurbishing the site of the show. Fences, jumps and stalls are repaired and 20 new stalls have been added. On the days of the show, families serve refreshments from the green and white striped canopied booths, help in the ring, and assist with parking.

All proceeds from the two-day even which attracts visitors from throughou the state, will go to the Crippled Children Hospital.
