COLLEGE REPORT

When the new campus of the California State College, Dominguez Hills, opens its doors this month, the multitude of planning details will come together for the first time to justify what we hope to be a smoothly functioning institute of higher education.

Primary component of any such complex, social structure involving a high level of traffic flow must deal efficiently with roads and thoroughways.

Drawing upon master architect, Quincy Jones, design and explanation of what will come, the following concepts are set forth:

MANY VISITORS see the Dominguez Hills campus for the first time when they drive on Avalon Boulevard. For a number of years, Avalon will provide the main approach.

Despite the power lines, Avalon could be much improved by careful planning. It is quite possible that the power lines could be looked upon with admiration for their large scale and commanding sentry over the campus. To accomplish any degree of success in a program to enrich the approaches to the campus will require planning and organization, to be sure, but the benefits might outweigh the bothersome details by several hundred-fold.

Avalon is wide at some points and narrow at others. It is one of several streets that lead to Dominguez Hills. If the communities can develop a plan for the maintenance of the streets and installation of colorful but inexpensive plant materials, their efforts will aid the college immeasurably by doing what they can to improve the total environment.

NEARLY everyone can remember a city or a community that he enjoyed when he drove down a flower-lined road or tree-lined street. The plan is to build a perimeter road inside the property line that will be open to all motor traffic without restriction. Parking areas with controls, located off the perimeter road, will serve all motor vehicles whether faculty, student, or visitor.

ULTIMATELY, the campus will have a four-lane road around the perimeter, immediately inside the property boundaries. This road will reduce congestion on campus by easing the flow of traffic both incoming and outgoing. The perimeter road feeds the parking lots but limits all vehicles to this road.

HOPEFULLY, the conveniences gained will far outweigh any objections to the separation of vehicle and pedestrian. The continuous building concept permits pedestrians to move easily and pleasantly from one space to another.

Automobiles will travel only on the perimeter road that rings the campus inside of the property line. All parking areas are outside of the academic core, next to the perimeter road.

The master plan separates automobile from bicycle from pedestrian.

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Garden Checklist

1. Feed established lawns now to insure a carpet of green through fall.
2. Spotty lawns may be renovated during the coming weeks, or a new lawn may be planted. Consult with your nurseryman for advice.
3. Plant sweet peas from seed now for bloom before the end of the year. Be sure you plant the winter-flowering varieties.
4. Perennial plants may be lifted and divided at this time if they are crowded.
5. Plant new varieties of tall Bearded Iris. Established irises that have become crowded may still be lifted, divided and replanted.

¼ C. Sauterine
½ tsp. instant minced onion
½ tsp. curry powder
Dash pepper
Parsley

Sprinkle chicken with seasoned salt and paprika; place in 1½-quart shallow baking dish. Dissolve chicken bouillon water, add wine, onion, curry powder and pepper. Pour over chicken. Cover with foil; bake in modern gas oven at 350° for 30 minutes. Uncover and bake 45 minutes longer. Remove chicken to
