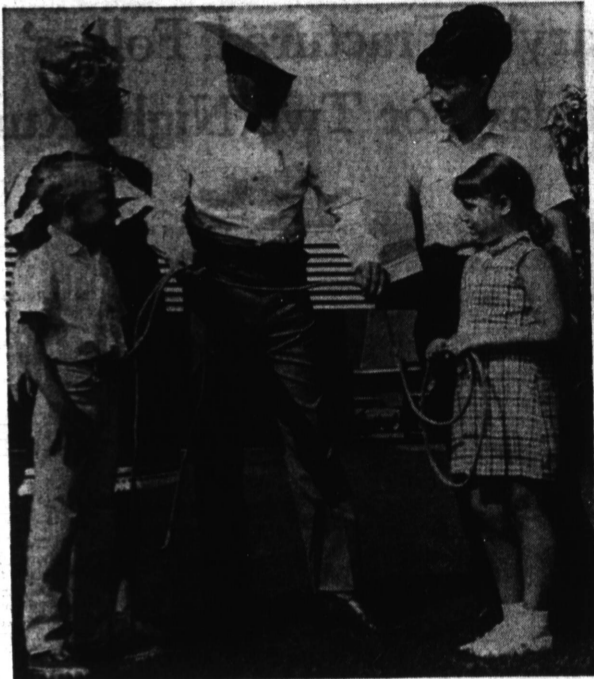
HOWARD WOOD

ORT Group Will Hear Hypnotist

Guest speaker for the Manhattan Beach Branch of the American Association of University Women, Monday, Oct. 9, will be the Rev. Carlo Weber, S. J., Ph.D. Father Weber will discuss "The Generation Gap" and concentrating on identification of the present-day values of society with emphasis on the circumstances leading to changes in traditional values.

A native Californian, Father Weber is currently assistant professor of psychology and director of psychological services at Loyola University in Los Angeles. His varied background includes a BA in classics from Gonzago University as well as a MA in philosophy and one in theology; his PhD work was done in clinical psychology at the University of Ottawa in Ontario, Canada. His clinical experience in psychology and psychiatry dates from 1962 to the present.
