Delegates At District CDA Meet

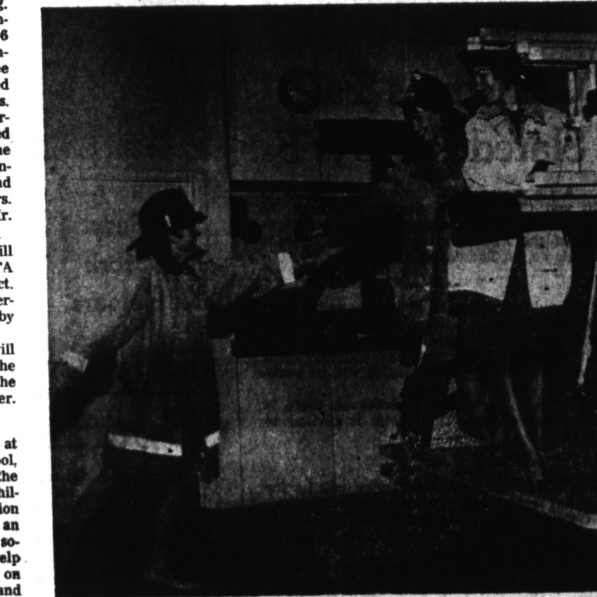
