MAYOR ISEN touched the subject of special balloting by saying that "it was the council's purpose that evening to decide whether or not the petitions pointed the way towards holding an election. The council would not decide the merits of the measures, he said.

"Let the people decide what is good or bad for the city in regard to this issue," the mayor stated in moving that the two issues be submitted to the voters.

As councilmen and other city officials sought to express their views on balloting, dissenters harrassed them with demands that their spokesmen be allowed to speak on the merits of the measure. Councilmen are generally in support of the Meadow Park Project.

COUNCILMAN Ken Miller agreed with Mayor Isen that he did not support the petitioners' view on the issue, but he felt that the measure should be submitted for a vote since several thousand area citizens had signed the petitions.

City Attorney Stan Remel-meyer stated that he did not think the petitions were valid. Even if the electorate votes support of the measures, he said, the decision would probably be overturned in court, meeting a fate similar to that of Proposition 14.

The Meadow Park Project, if completed on schedule five years from now, would attract from throughout the country. The project will develop an airport-oriented industrial park which will net the city taxes amounting to more than eight times what is now being collected from the area.

### Probe of Area Fire Under Way

Sheriff's officers today were continuing their investigation into possible foul play connected with the death of a 59-year-old Dominguez man early Monday.

Ocie Claude McMurry, of 1305 E. 216th St., was found dead Monday in his burning home. Sheriff's detectives said McMurry died as a result of massive blows to the head and added they may have been sustained before the fire started.

The sheriff's arson unit also was investigating the blaze, which was reported shortly after 3 a.m. Monday.

Fire units from the County Fire Department put out the fire, which apparently started in the living room. Damage to the \$30,000 home was estimated at \$4,500.

### Townsend to Seek Repeal Of 'Impossible' Statute

Assemblyman L. E. (Larry) Townsend (D-Torrance) today announced he will introduce emergency legislation at the November special session to correct a law adopted during the last session of the legislature.

Townsend said his emergency measure will repeal Senate Bill 631, which was designed originally to prohibit the parking of campers and mobile homes overnight on state highways.

The wording of the bill, however, is such that it would prohibit parking campers and mobile homes on all streets and highways in the state. It is scheduled to become law Nov. 8.

"My office," Townsend said, "has been deluged with calls from camper owners who are confused about the intent of this new law and after reading the final version of the

bill which was adopted, I'm also confused about it." The Torrance legislator said there was no opposition to the bill, apparently because everyone concerned believed it affected only state highways.

The legislature is scheduled to convene Nov. 6 for a special session to consider reapportionment of the state's congressional districts. Townsend said emergency legislation could be introduced at the session.

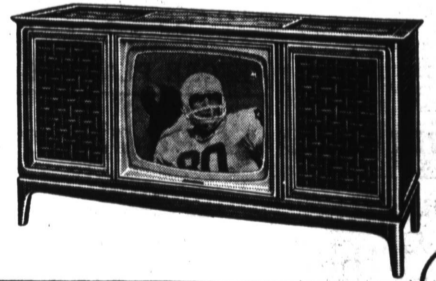
