(Continued from Page A-1) Meadow Park Project, if federal funds should be cancelled, City Manager Ed Ferraro has suggested a freeze on \$1 million in the city budget now committed to "non-essentials." The council will review the proposed freeze at its meeting Tuesday at 5:30 p.m.

Mayor Albert Isen said he thought that a cut-off of federal funds for the project would put a great burden on the taxpayer and also "stifle" industry.

Councilman George Vico told anti-urban renewal representatives at the meeting, "I don't think you people realize how much this is going to cost the city of Torrance." Councilman Jay Beasley added that he didn't think the people who signed the two anti-renewal petitions were informed of the consequences when they offered their signatures.

(Continued from Page A-1) ment) are not abandoning the project," one official said. "They still feel it is one of the most worthy in California."

The freeze on funds was ordered just hours before the first check — reportedly for some \$380,000 — was to be issued, the Press-Herald learned. That check would have represented the federal government's share of escrows which are due to close within the next 30 days.

The current dilemma developed Tuesday evening when the City Council, overruling City Attorney Stanley Remelmeyer, ordered a special election on two initiative

petitions circulated by Active Citizens of Torrance (ACT).

ACT OBTAINED signatures of more than the necessary 15 per cent of the city's registered voters on each of the petitions. One of the measures seeks to repeal the Uniform Housing Code and the second would repeal the ordinance which established the Redevelopment Agency of the City of Torrance.

Approval by the voters — which requires only a simple majority — would effectively end the Meadow Park Project. Remelmeyer, at Tuesday's meeting, predicted that results of the election would be overturned in court if voters approve the two measures.

And HUD officials Thursday said they would make the city live up to its agreements to complete the Meadow Park Project.
