

Crash Leads To Arrest

Drunk driving charges have been lodged against 23-year-old Jessie "Mac" McPherson, 1426 W. 126th St., who was involved in a three-car collision Sunday night.

When Torrance police officers arrived at the scene of the crash on Western Avenue, they transported McPherson to Harbor General Hospital. He submitted to head X-rays but refused treatment for the laceration on his forehead, police said.

McPherson had to be physically restrained by officers several times while awaiting treatment.

Felony hit-and-run charges have been lodged against a Torrance teenager after he hit a 3-year-old child with his motorcycle Saturday on 220th Street and then left the scene of the accident.

Torrance police arrested John L. Coen, 16, of 25212 Cypress St., Lomita, after his motorcycle ran into Kelly Duane Burns of 2020 Arlington Ave. Kelly's parents took him to Torrance Memorial Hospital for treatment of bumps, abrasions, and a swollen ankle.

The accident occurred about 3 p.m. Saturday when the little boy stepped out onto 220th Street from between parked cars. The driver of the motorcycle said he saw the wheel hit the child's foot but was too frightened to stop and offer assistance.

The Narbonne High School student was picked up by Torrance police about an hour after the accident. Police said Coen would not have been held if her had not left the scene.

 ly higher rate does he choose that medium.

RUPERT pointed out that keeping Torrance money in local time deposits helps area taxpayers in two ways. It earns high interest rates for the city and also makes extra money available for loans to the public through these local banks. The city has established excellent relations with Torrance banks through this program, Rupert added.

In order to do his job effectively, Rupert must be concerned with the national money market, studying day-by-day changes in the demand for dollars. He has to make educated guesses about long-range economic trends based on his observations.

Every major economic occurrence, such as a strike against a mammoth car manufacturing plant, snowballs back to affect the return on Torrance investments in the national money market, Rupert stated.

TO ILLUSTRATE the city's no-waste policy in regard to investing idle funds, Rupert said, "We even invest money we don't have." The name of this game, he explained, is "playing the float."

The game is played by investing funds which have already been distributed in the form of payroll checks, for example. Even though the checks have been distributed, Rupert said, they will not clear their home bank for at least four days. In the interim, why not have that money working for the taxpayer?

"Almost every housewife does the same thing with her household budget," Rupert quipped.

 day with top ranking city officials, the federal agency did agree to provide administrative overhead for the Redevelopment Agency pending the outcome of the election.

Petitions demanding the special election were circulated by Active Citizens of Torrance, which obtained signatures of more than 15 percent of the city's registered voters — enough to comply with election laws for a special election.

CITY ATTORNEY Stanley

Remelmeier, in a lengthy opinion handed to councilmen last night, said the measure to abolish the Redevelopment Agency is invalid.

He recommended that the council file the petition and "take no further action on it."

Remelmeier, in a second opinion, said he was unable to determine the validity of the housing code measure and said it should "be submitted to the electorate." He added that if the voters approve the measure, the city should then seek to determine its validity "by a judicial proceeding."


MEANWHILE, councilmen have voted to use city funds

to close escrows now in progress. Twenty property owners are involved in that action and approximately \$750,000 will be needed to close the escrows, it has been reported.

The Press-Herald was told late Tuesday that top ranking officials of the Department of Housing and Urban Affairs in Washington are "looking into" the current situation.

Federal funds for the project — a grant of \$3.4 million and a total borrowing authority of some \$6.2 million — have not been reallocated. The funds will be available to finance the project once the current legal battles are ended, it was emphasized.


