Capt. Johns spoke on "Sally and the Swinging Door," stress-ing the work of the Liaison League Rehabilitation Group Inc. which she helped to establish. The Liaison League is currently engaged in a fund-raising cam-paign to build "Liaison House" where women released from Sybil Brand could live until they are ready to face the "outside world."

Capt. Johns is a widow and great grandmother who has been a civil servant since 1942. She de-veloped the building plans for Sybil Brand Institute, one of the most modern women's jails in the nation. The facility, located in East Los Angeles, is noted for its spacious grounds and homelike towers on its 23 acres and dormi-tories take the place of cells.

When prisoners at Sybil Brand Institute heard that Capt. Johns was to be honored at the club dinner, they spent two weeks re-forctiong table centerpiece of red, white, and blue feather flowers with "Capt. Ruth Johns" emblaz-oned in blue pipestems across the front.
