Woman Dies in Doctor's Office; Probe Ordered

A 41-year-old woman became ill and died in a Torrance doctor's office Saturday after she reportedly received an injection of liver iron, and estrogen.

Pronounced dead shortly after noon was Ethel M. Davis, 1300 Roth Place, San Pedro, who was being treated for a nervous condition. She had excused herself to go to the rest room after receiving the injection, complaining of feeling nauseous. A nurse discovered her collapsed form shortly afterwards.

Mrs. Davis failed to respond to adrenalin injected into her heart. Her husband, Donald Davis, had been waiting for her in the car. He identified the body.

Exact cause of death is pending a coroner's investigation.

Mrs. Davis had been a patient of the doctor's for the past 10 years.

Designs Slated For New Plane

Most Murders Involve Family or Associates

SACRAMENTO — About two out of three wilful homicides in California involve domestic or family conflicts or arguments between friends and associates.

The state Bureau of Criminal Statistics reported on a study of wilful homicides in California for the three-year period, 1963-65.

The study involved 1,936 incidents which resulted in death to 2,042 persons. Of the total, 609 of the wilful homicides were the result of domestic or family conflicts—most of them occurring in the home of the victim; and 557

were among friends or associates. Another 318 related to criminal activities, 320 were because of altercations between strangers, and in 132 cases there was no information.

IN THE majority of the cases, the victim and his slayer were of the same race. Homicides were committed with firearms in 46 per cent of the cases or a total of 890; piercing instruments in 468 cases; blunt instruments in 148; strangulation or suffocation in 120; beating, in 202; and no information in nine cases.

A total of 2,178 persons were arrested and charged with wilful homicide, of which 1,777 were held for prosecution. Of the 1,667 prosecuted, convictions were obtained in 1,232 cases, or 69.3 per cent.

ALMOST 15 per cent of the men prosecuted were convicted of first degree murder while only 3.5 per cent of the women prosecuted were convicted of first degree murder.

The first degree murder convictions ran much higher for those incidents related to criminal activity than for those arising from family quarrels or altercations be-

tween friends or associates. Of those charged in homicides involving other criminal activity, 84 per cent were convicted—53.9 per cent of first degree murder. In the other situations, only 72 per cent were convicted and only 6.3 of these were for first degree murder.
