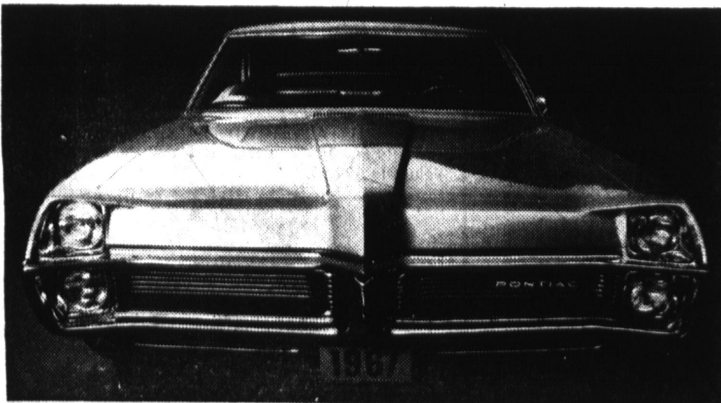

BEFORE BOARD ACTS

Teachers Want to Voice Views on School Policy

Torrance teachers agree that the Board of Education must make policy decisions, but the teachers at least want to be heard before those decisions are made.

"We are not asking you to agree with us," Noel Marble, executive secretary of the Torrance Education Association (TEA), told trustees Wednesday evening, "but we want to be consulted first."

Machinery to consult the teachers has been established under recent state legislation, which provides for the estab-

lishment of a Negotiating Council. The council is entitled to "meet and confer" with a representative of the Board of Education — at the request of the council — on any issue of concern to teachers under provisions of the law.

THE SPECIFIC issue Wednesday involved the manner in which minutes of Negotiating Council minutes would be presented to the Board of Education. Marble asked that the matter be re-

ferred to the Negotiating Council for discussion before board action.

"We are proposing that, in general, the organized profession be consulted prior to adoption of a policy by the Board of Education," Marble told trustees in a memo.

MARBLE SAID the basic reason for his request was a feeling that the group which must "live with this policy, or any policy, should be involved in the formulation

Trustees referred the issue of Negotiating Council minutes, but warned they would not commit themselves to taking no action on all future policy matters.

MRS. KENNETH E. Watts told Marble she was "very firm" in the conviction that the board should not commit itself to taking no action until the teachers' group had

been consulted. "Everything," she added, "relates to teachers."
