

Hopes for construction of a 250-bed modern hospital to replace the 42-year-old Torrance Memorial Hospital board in San Francisco this moved nearer to reality this week with approval of more than \$1.5 million in federal funds for the project.

Approval for the federal share of the project came in San Francisco after representatives of the hospital and of Riviera Community Hospital appeared before the State Hospital Advisory Council to press their application for the funds.

Matching funds from state sources and local sources is needed to complete the financing arrangements, TMH Administrator Leonard Ensembles.
