Sir Beaumain's Auxiliary of Children's Home Society is busily preparing invitations to be mailed to prospective members and interested persons throughout the South Bay for an Interpretation Social to be held Monday; Jan. 30 at 7:30 p.m. at the Torrance YMCA on Sepulveda Blvd.

Mrs. Eloise Segebartt, director of volunteers for the Los Angeles area, will be the guest speaker and will show slides entitled "A Time for Rejoicing," narrated by Rosemary DeCamp. These slides dramatize the 75-year history of Children's Home Society. There will be a period for questions at the close of the program.

There are 12,000 women in the more than 200 auxiliaries in California who raise at least 20 per cent of the Society's annual operating income.

In the 75 year history of Children's Home Society, approximately 28,000 children have been placed in homes where they can grow strong and secure because "they belong." Figures show that one out of five children adopted in California through licensed agencies in 1966 found a home through Children's Home Society, one of the 31 licensed adoption agencies in the State.

Every child's inherent right to a home and parents of his own is the keystone of the Society's adoption service. With professional skill and warm understanding, Children's Home Society serves the child, whose greatest need is love and security of a home of his very own; the natural parents seeking help in planning for the future of their child; and couples desiring to complete their families through adoption.
