## Role as Economi zer May Be Rough One for Reagan

The outraged reaction to Governor Reagan's sugges-tion that modest tuition charges be imposed at state supported universities-\$400 for University of California students and \$200 for State College students—in dicates that the role of Gov ernor as economizer is going to be mighty difficult.

Some of the comments have verged on hysteria. A statement, for example, by the UC Berkeley faculty held that tuitions fees would make it more difficult to hire and retain faculty and (would) lower the quality of higher education." This seems unlikely in view of the fact that Harvard University, with a tuition rate of \$1760, manages to maintain a fairly respectable academic standing.

Academic Senate of the State College at Los Angeles called tuition a "discriminatory tax" on students and their parents. It could easily be argued that general tax support for higher education, which is not compulsory, is discriminatory against non - parents, parents who send children to private colleges and parents of children who can't qualify academically to attend college.

In analyzing the pros and cons, it might be helpful to investigate the practices of other states. Lovejoy's 1966 College Guide lists minimum student fees at UC at \$220 per year. Fees at the California State Colleges

vary; at Sacramento State they are shown at \$96 per
