

By achieving top marks in the 13th annual written knowledge and attitude examination dealing with homemaking, the local winners will be awarded a speners will be awarded a spe-cial Betty Crocker silver charm and will remain eligi-ble for scholarships ranging from \$500 to \$5,000. Regis-tering for the 1967 test were 581,334 girls in 14,752 high schools.

In the program's next a state Homemaker of Tomorrow will be select-ed from the high school win-ners of the state. She will receive a \$1,500 scholarship,

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and her school will be awarded a set of Encyclopaedia Britannica by Ency clopaedia Britannica, Inc The runner-up will receive a \$500 scholarship.

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Following her selection, the State Homemaker of To-morrow, together with a school advisor, will join win-ners and advisors from each of the 49 other states and the District of Columbia in an expense-paid educational tour of Colonial Williamsburg, Va., and Washington, D. C. Climax of the trip will be the naming of the 1967 Betty Crocker All-American Homemaker of Tomorrow. Chosen from the state win-ners on the basis of her original test score, plus per sonal observation and interviews during the tour, she will receive a scholarship increased to \$5,000. Grants of second-, third- and fourthranking Homemakers of Tomorrow in the nation will be raised to \$4,000, \$3,000 and \$2,000, respectively
