### **Councilmen** Try New Pay Hike

For the second time in a year, Torrance councilmen will ask the voters for a pay increase.

Councilmen acted unanimously-and without debate-last night to place two charter amendments on the April 18 ballot which will, if approved by voters, immediately increase the \$100 salary now paid to councilmen to \$300 per month.

Voters rejected a similar proposal in April, 1966, by a 2-to-1 margin and turned down a charter amendment which would have increased the salary of the mayor to \$400 by the same margin. Actual effect of the amendments as proposed

will be to provide for salaries which are identical to those paid councilmen in general law cities the same size as Torrance.

Under existing state law, adopted by the Legislature in 1966, councilmen in a general law city of 140,000 persons would be paid \$300 each month. Torrance is a charter city and such acts by the

State Legislature have no effect in the city. The second amendment actually will have no meaning at this time, should it be approved, one city official reported. The added measure, provides that the mayor shall receive a salary equal to that of "mayors of general law cities the size of Torrance who are elected by the people.

Under existing law, no special distinction is made between the mayor and a councilman.

The amendments, if approved, would become effective on the day after the election.

Voters will be asked to approve a \$2.3 million library bond issue April 18 and to elect two members of the school board in a consolidated election.






