Veterans Get \$1.5 Billion Of Insurance

Nearly 210,000 policies with a face value of about \$1.5 billion were issued to disabled World War II and Korean Conflict veterans during the reopening of the National Service Life Insurance, the Veterans Administration has reported.

The one year reopening period was from May, 1965, to May, 1966.

Some 390,000 applications were received during the NSLI reopening, 118,000 of them during the last six working days before the May 3, 1966, deadline.

About 40 per cent of the applications had to be disapproved. Some applicants did not have service-connected disabilities. Others failed to complete applications and some did not have the required military service.

This insurance program is self-supporting.
