For Mexican Orphanages

When a little Mexican boy stole a loaf of bread eleven years ago, neither he nor the authorities could ever have imagined that the consequences would touch Torrance-Palos Verdes resi-

dents.

The story might never have been told in Southern California if it weren't for a young Ameri-can priest, Father William Wasson, who befriended the young-ster and saved him from jail. Soon word spread throughout the Mexican countryside — "The Padre Wasson takes in orphans" —and motherless ones were directed to his doorstep.

Today Father Wasson tries to support three orphanages housing 600 younsters. His aim is to provide more than food and shelter. "We must do more than baby-sit. We must teach them, educate them to become valuable citizens

of Mexico," he insists.

His zeal for the childrens' education so impressed the nuns at Palos Verdes Estates' Marymount College that they in turn interested the laity in the priest and

Less than two years ago the Palos Verdes Peninsula Friends of Nuestros Pequenos Hermanos was organized. Its members have was organized. Its inembers have sent every kind of aid to Father Wasson and his charges, and most importantly Dr. Andrew J. DePaolo, Rolling Hills Estates, set up a dental program. His pa tients had never seen a dentist or a toothbrush.

Dr. De Paolo donates his time

and services but needs dental

equipment and materials to train some assistants. To finance dental clinics in the three orphanages, the peninsula group has set a Fiesta of Art for April 23.
