Victor School Hosts Torrance Principals

Victor Elementary School, 4820 Spencer St., had an opportunity to find out recently when the Torrance Unified School District's 40 principals and top brass decided to tour the school en masse.

The administrators, who usually hold their weekly administrator's meetings in the district central offices, decided to meet in the field last week in order to broaden their perspective by first-hand experience.

ACCORDING to Victor's principal, Martin Beaudet, faculty members found the attention flattering.

Learning just 24 hours earlier that they were to be under observation, the teachers chose to carry on "business as usual," conducting the lessons they had previously planned and paying as little attention as possible to the droves of visitors that wandered in and out of their rooms.

Not only did visiting principals pick up pointers to pass along to their own teachers, Beaudet said, but they had a

few constructive suggestions to leave behind as well.

"FOR SOME of the high school principals," Beaudet commented, "this was the first time they had ever toured an elementary school. They found it an eye-opening experience. District personnel who had planned such phases of the curriculum as the Economics project had a chance to see it in action."

Mike Roy Honored By Chefs

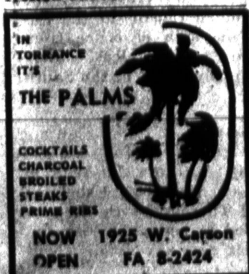
