Rather than argue and remain on the phone too long she accepts, to avoid catching pneumonia. Or gain the reputation as the neighborhood Bridget Bardot.


Of course, I have heard of prospective candidates for the job who have used the weakest and often the most ridiculous reasons for not accepting he presidency. I know, because I've used every
